LITTLETHORPE MANOR VISIT

In August, Society members visited the gardens of Littlethorpe Manor. David Hall, who organised the visit, reports:

'Summer excursions by Ripon Civic Society members have become something of a rarity in recent years and it was therefore with some trepidation that an outing to Littlethorpe Manor Gardens was recently organised. The response was truly gratifying however: 27 members of the Society and friends signed up to tour this local horticultural gem on Friday 18 August.

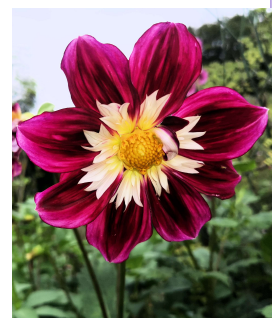


'Our guide for the afternoon was head gardener Eddie Harland, ably assisted by his wife, Michele. Having been in post since 1998 Eddie was well qualified to explain not only the history and development of the garden project but also to field knowledgeably the many questions from those attending about the diverse plantings and plant species. The two-hour meander through the eleven acres of diverse formal and parkland areas was both entertaining and, on occasions, breathtaking.

'The afternoon concluded with welcome refreshments and an opportunity to purchase a souvenir of the visit from the well-stocked selection of herbaceous plants on offer.

PLANNING MATTERS

PLANS FOR BUILDING AT STUDLEY ROYAL CANAL GATES ENTRANCE



THE NATIONAL TRUST has put forward proposals for a new and more-accessible café, admission point and toilets at the Canal Gates entrance to the Studley Royal Water Garden. Named the Studley Revealed project, the changes will also see space for better interpretation of the water garden, so that visitors will fully understand the importance of the landscape.

The application envisages a new building (*artists impressions above and below*), designed by architects Feilden Fowles, which would sit behind and beside the existing café building. It would contain a new café, with the current rooms being used for displays; a large open area would link the two. The design of the new structure is fitted

with glass facing to lake and is landscaped against a screen of trees. It will have a lower profile than the existing building. The plan is for the new complex to sit inside the pay-for-entry part of the Studley Royal and Fountains Abbey site. Planning application has also been made for a kiosk in the Deer Park car park to cater for visitors - many of who are likely to be more local - who visit the park but do not wish to enter the pay zone. The restaurant and parking at the main visitor centre, at the other end of the site, will remain free for all to access. Ripon Civic Society was one of the groups consulted as the plans were being formulated. The Committee will consider the plans carefully, and we will make our comments in due course.



RIPON CATHEDRAL PLANS



THE PLANNING APPLICATION for a new building on Minster Gardens to serve the needs of Ripon Cathedral is currently expected to go for decision by planners on North Yorkshire Council in October. Members will know that the Committee has lodged objections to the proposals for several reasons, outlined in our last Newsletter. We note that among the 394 documents relating to the planning application submitted to North Yorkshire Council is a locally-organised petition containing more than 1000 signatures objecting to the use of Minster Gardens and the loss of trees.

Separately we are also looking carefully at the possible transfer of ownership from North Yorkshire Council to the Chapter of Ripon Cathedral if planning permission is granted. We are, in particular, assessing the statements given by the then Harrogate Borough Council (now superseded by North Yorkshire Council) when we put in a Freedom of Information request in January of this year and comparing them with information subsequently received from North Yorkshire Council.

We shall report further in the next Newsletter.

SOME OTHER BUILDINGS



THE FORMER SPA HOTEL, now renamed The Ripon Inn, is scheduled to open in October. We look forward to seeing the changes wrought over the last couple of years to this important Ripon landmark.



THE SPA BATHS buildings continue to concern the Society; we have seen plans for their use, but at the time of writing there seems to be little progress. We will continue to press for a fast and acceptable solution to the use of these important structures.

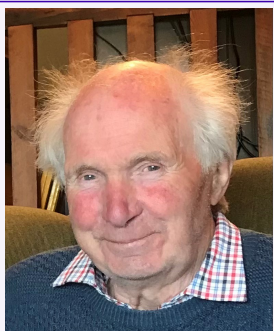

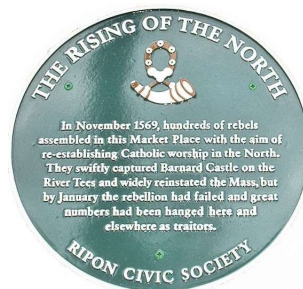

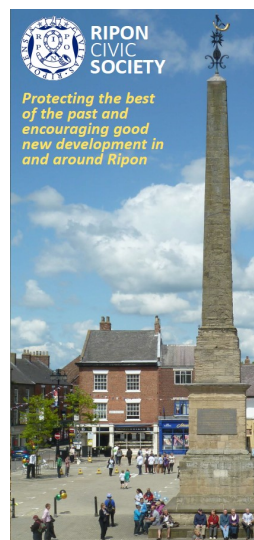
WHAT ABOUT THE GREEN PLAQUES?
